Chairperson's Report



Each year seems to bring great tragedy and suffering to people somewhere in the world. This year we appear to be on the edge, on the cusp, of even more troubled times with the disaster continuing to unfold in Ukraine following the invasion, and with the suffering of innocent people in the Middle East, and in so many parts of the world – with people displaced and left homeless as a direct consequence of war, of military action, and of climate change induced environmental catastrophe.



In such times, the role of the AMRC, although impacting upon only a small fraction of people so affected, becomes even more important – and the continuing work of the AMRC even more vital.

As an organisation, AMRC has continued to flourish, and in that sense, 2023 has been a successful year for the AMRC in being able to deliver services to clients and members, and to contribute to the community and to the State. 2023 has also marked the beginning of a new chapter - I commend and congratulate our CEO Mirsia Bunjaku who, in her first year in the role, has led the excellent work of AMRC.

Highlights in terms of the activities and achievements of the AMRC during this past year have included undergoing successful audits of our Aged Care and NDIS programs, and of our compliance with Workplace Gender Equality reporting obligations; the extension of a number of our current programs including the Community Support Program, Skilled Migrants, Emergency Relief, and Commonwealth Home Support Program; and convening successful major events including the International Women's Forum, SA Refugee Week and the Youth Forum.



The AMRC operates programs throughout South Australia, and during the past year our activities have encompassed regional expansion, including holding a significant forum in Whyalla in partnership with the Whyalla City Council, Department of Home Affairs and Department of Innovation, Industry and Science; initiating a new project for strong and resilient communities through funding from DSS; and the establishment of a new office in Mt Gambier to be opened in early 2024, with our current offices being repurposed to benefit the clients of the AMRC.

On behalf of the Board, I congratulate our CEO Mirsia Bunjaku, our deputy CEO Alex Parken, the Management team, and all of our staff on these achievements, and for their professionalism, diligence, teamwork, and collaboration with partners, ensuring that the AMRC continues as the leading settlement agency in South Australia. I thank our volunteers, who contribute so importantly to the work of the AMRC. I would like to acknowledge and thank our State and Federal governments for their assistance and support to deliver our programs, as well as our donors and collaborating partners.

I also take this opportunity to acknowledge my fellow Board members, as the term of the current Directors comes to an end. In addition to the ongoing task of providing governance of the AMRC, the Board has, amongst other things, this year finalised a new strategic plan; undergone governance training; and implemented initiatives to align with the Aged Care Strengthening Governance Reforms. I would like to thank each of my fellow Board members, Deputy Chair Elizabeth Ho OAM, Treasurer Denis Yengi, Tarik Beden, Raghad Dib, Vahedeh Mansoury, Hussain Razaiat, Erika Vickery OAM, and Evelyn Yap OAM, for their dedication in providing freely of their expertise and experience in guiding the AMRC. In particular, I would like to acknowledge Mabok Deng Mabok Marial who is retiring after some 14 years on the AMRC Board. Mabok is a well-respected community leader who has served as Vice Chair and later Chair of the African Communities Council of South Australia between 2008 and 2020, and as Secretary General of the Sudanese Community Association, along with many other important community roles. Mabok has made a significant contribution to the AMRC during his time on the Board with his calm and wise approach to decision making. On behalf of the Board, staff and volunteers of the AMRC we thank him.

I congratulate our new Board members for the 2024 to 2026 term, including the newest member of the Board, Tukini Tavui, and look forward to continuing to work with my fellow Board members to further the goals of the AMRC. We also look forward to our continuing relationship with our immediate past CEO, and Life Member, Eugenia Tsoulis.

Chief Executive Officer's Report

Twelve months ago I put on some very big shoes and for me, as a person from refugee background, it was very meaningful. So, I am honoured to present my first report as CEO, reflecting on the past year.

I began this role, acknowledging the immense legacy left by Eugenia Tsoulis, whose dedication and impact in the settlement sector, education and arts spanned decades. While I cannot replicate her journey, stepping into her shoes has fueled my passion and commitment to continue driving positive change in the sector.

As we know, settlement services are delivered in a changing environment. With the number of global conflicts we see the importance of working together, supporting an environment where everyone is valued and having the same understanding that every human life is sacred, no matter where they come from. In these times we need to walk together with one another more than ever.

2023 commenced on a positive note with the announcement of the Resolution of Status (RoS) visa for those who have been patiently waiting for more than a decade for certainty about their future. We acknowledge the government for this initiative and we hope that further progress will be made in relation to fast tracking family reunion.

Our ongoing settlement work across South Australia continues to yield great outcomes for new arrivals. The new project, Strong and Resilient Communities, is supporting many women and vulnerable clients participate, connect, build confidence and develop training and employment pathways while overcoming various barriers. Throughout the year we assisted over 350 people engage in employment through many of the AMRC activities. In collaboration with Multicultural Youth Link SA we have engaged and supported over 400 young people, most notably through the Youth Parliament initiatives and a highly successful Youth Forum held in early October and led by young people that drew over 150 participants.

This year, again, we have continued to work on many initiatives with different ethnic groups and community members throughout South Australia and I thank you all for your ongoing partnership. As a result, we saw our facilities utilised with up to 30,000 attendances. Our partnership with AMEP across 3 AMRC outlets continues to deliver great outcomes in English acquisition and other pathways.

We continue to make progress in raising awareness in disability and aged care, assisting carers and individuals to navigate services through NDIS and Aged Care and increasing cultural awareness with service providers.

I'm happy to share that our regional offices are significantly impacting local settlement, sustainability, and employment. With state government support we have completed the redevelopment of the community centre in Mt Gambier which can now be used by more community groups.

In addition, we're leading an initiative nationwide, facilitating skilled migrants' connections to employment opportunities and supporting their successful settlement in the new country supported by state Government.

Through significant events we brought together the South Australian community to share their stories. Over 200 women showcased resilience and strength, coming together at our International Women's Day event.



AMRC's Refugee Week saw a record number of event registrations from over 100 organizations, including schools, government bodies, NGOs, and migrant and refugee background communities. Three major events undertaken in partnership with the South Australian Parliament, Adelaide City Council, and Adelaide Festival Centre drew over 400 participants, connecting refugee communities and agencies across South Australia. The Youth Poster Awards engaged 56 schools with 375 entries, with the exhibition touring South Australia, mainly via local councils. Moreover, a collaboration with the Refugee Council of Australia showcased Adelaide faces in national Refugee Week promotions.

In times of need our South Australian community came together to support people and their communities affected by the earthquakes in Syria and Turkiye. The AMRC supported these communities with various fundraising events.

In Murray Bridge the Multicultural Yuntu-Walun (which means coming together) Festival, was a true highlight of community harmony with over 1,000 people attending from the wider community.

This year has also been a year of many reviews and consultations on settlement, migration, the Multicultural Framework, employment, education, skill assessment, aged care, disability and others. The AMRC has contributed to these and other consultation processes through direct submissions, taking part in focus groups, being a member of advisory bodies and through peak bodies such as the Settlement Council of Australia.

Our impact has continued through supporting the various research projects into our sector around youth wellbeing, migration, housing, health, business and others, both in the state and nationally. All of this would not be possible without the dedicated team at the AMRC whose passion, commitment, and collective spirit drive our achievements. Special thanks must go to the Deputy CEO and a great management team who bring so much enthusiasm, energy and deep commitment to our purpose. That team is supported by a highly effective and committed Board, with decades of combined experience, knowledge, and links into local and national networks.

To all staff, volunteers, and Board members, your ongoing support and guidance has been instrumental in driving positive outcomes for our client groups and communities, and I am continuously inspired by your passion and dedication.

I would also like to thank all of our partners, the ethnic communities, and the peak ethnic organisations ACCSA, MECCSA, LCMN, TMN, MMN, CMRW, NWMN, MYLSA, AMEP, all of our colleagues across government, the broader community sector, peak bodies, local government, industry, other stakeholders and various donors that have contributed to our work in the settlement of new arrivals in South Australia, both directly and indirectly.

While the past year has been a journey of challenges and triumphs, it has reinforced our commitment to making a meaningful difference for those we work with. I look forward to our continued collaborations and collective efforts as we strive to support an inclusive, caring, empowered, and vibrant community where everyone belongs and prospers.

Eugenia has over 50 years of experience working on multicultural policy research and change management within a human rights framework. She has held leadership positions in the mental health, education, arts, employment and training sectors. As Director of the Migrant Workers Centre, she furthered migrant women's employment, training and participation, and managed cultural diversity in the workplace. She was at the forefront of cultural development in the arts, being a member of the inaugural CALD Advisory Committee to the Australia Council for the Arts. Over the past 25 years, as CEO of the AMRC, Eugenia has overseen the expanding work of the organisation in South Australia, supporting social, cultural and economic development and ensuring the AMRC's critical leadership position in Australia's settlement sector. Eugenia was a founding member of the Settlement Council of Australia. She has contributed to a considerable number of research reports and their allied publications and served on innumerable state and commonwealth boards and advisory committees. She was appointed an Inaugural Life Member of the AMRC in 2022.

Service Development and Innovation

In 2023, we continued our focus on service improvement, development and innovation based on new and emerging needs with the following initiatives and accomplishments:

- Established the Inclusive Communities Project supporting women and others to engage the community in training and employment pathways.
- Continued the Afghan-Australian Community and Settlement Support project in partnership with the Afghan United Association of SA (AUASA) and MECCSA.
- Continued the Ukrainian Displaced People's Services in partnership with the Association of Ukrainians SA.
- Delivered services to skilled migrants, supporting employment engagement and sustainability.
- Updated the Mt Gambier community centre to be utilised by various groups living in the city.
- Connected with stakeholders in Whyalla and held a forum in June supporting new arrivals and meeting workforce demands in the region.
- Achieved certificate and award levels in the Australian Service Excellence Standards (ASES).
- Re-accredited as a White Ribbon Workplace.
- Ranked well compared to other similar organisations in relation to Workplace Gender Equality.
- Achieved 100% compliance in NDIS and Home Care Audits with zero non-conformities.

- Maintained Registered Training Organisation status, delivering Cultural Awareness Training, Domestic Violence Prevention Training, Child Safe Environment Training, Volunteer Training and Pre-Vocational Employment Training
- In partnership with AMEP, opened night English classes in Naracoorte to accommodate those who are not able to attend day classes due to work.
- In partnership with the Afghan United Association of SA, delivered information sessions with guest speakers from NDIA, SA Health and Office for Autism to enhance disability awareness in the community and to strengthen its capacity to navigate the health system. Sessions were held at the local mosque and at the Wali E Asr Centre.
- Involved young people from refugee backgrounds to speak at various mainstream schools, sharing their own journeys of resilience. This initiative promotes diversity and understanding while also building the confidence and capacity of young people with public speaking and advocacy.

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Settlement and Community Services

Enhancing Impact, Building Capacity

All AMRC services are delivered across six outlets around South Australia and offer settlement support to individuals and communities from refugee and migrant backgrounds in their local area, promoting equal access and opportunity, social cohesion and sustainability while contributing to Australia's cultural, social and economic life.

Our comprehensive array of tailored settlement services covers a broad spectrum, including assistance with housing, language learning, employment opportunities, education pathways, healthcare access, cultural orientation, legal information, specialized intensive support and capacity building at individual and community levels. All programs are designed to facilitate successful settlement outcomes by promoting and assisting the transition to self-sufficiency, all the while fostering a sense of belonging and empowerment among the new arrivals. Throughout 2023, our team provided support through several key programs:

Humanitarian Settlement Program (HSP) and Specialised Intensive Services (SIS): Providing specialized and intensive support specifically tailored for humanitarian arrivals, ensuring their unique needs are addressed effectively during the settlement process.

Settlement Engagement and Transition Support Program (SETS): Offering a wide range of client services, capacity building initiatives, and domestic and family violence support services to support the settlement and integration of individuals within the community.

Community Support Program (CSP):

Operating as an Approved Proposing Organisation (APO), our team assists individuals in humanitarian situations overseas by managing the visa application process and facilitating their settlement upon arrival, including accommodation assistance and community support.

Skilled Migrants Services: Focusing on supporting skilled migrants by providing resources and guidance to help them connect and settle in their new country.


Core Funded Targeted Services: Offering essential settlement services to further support individuals and communities build their capacity and engage with the broader community through various activities and events including forums, Harmony Week and Refugee Week.

Our approach encompasses individualised services, casework management, group initiatives, workshops, capacity building, engagement with stakeholders, mainstream and community events, ensuring a holistic support system to foster successful settlement within the community.

Highlights

In 2023 the AMRC's initiatives encompassed a diverse range of events and programs, showcasing a deep commitment to successful settlement through community engagement, cultural celebration, and support.

Settlement Support and Capacity Building

Educational Sessions

The AMRC hosted several educational sessions focusing on crucial topics such as health, housing, training, employment, disability, aged care, legal information, migration, road safety, citizenship preparation, cyber-security etc. These sessions were delivered in collaboration with key stakeholders and were held with diverse community groups across South Australia, thus equipping new arrivals with essential knowledge, resources and connections to increase their awareness and to support them on their settlement journey.

Consultative Forums

These forums, held across the Adelaide, Salisbury, Murraylands, Naracoorte, Bordertown, and Mt Gambier MRCs, engaged community leaders on significant changes to visas and sponsorship, gave feedback on current policies and the multicultural framework review, thereby providing them with vital information and opportunities for discussion, advocacy and feedback.

Permanent Visa Pathways Information Sessions

Offering information about visa pathways and application processes, these sessions were vital for individuals navigating the complex landscape of migration, especially those on bridging visas and seeking permanent residency in Australia.

Youth Parliament 2023

Eight young people were nominated to the 2023 Youth Parliament auspiced by the YMCA and supported by the AMRC. This training gives new arrival youths the confidence they need to ensure they are engaged and have a voice on matters which affect them. It is one of the more visible ways in which the AMRC supports our young people to build their future.



Child Safe Environment Training

By imparting knowledge and strategies for creating safe environments, these trainings provide the tools to diverse participants to contribute to a safer community, an outcome which is of particular importance for vulnerable groups like children.

SA Cricket Association

In a collaborative effort, the AMRC engaged in consultations with the SA Cricket Association to conceptualize a Multicultural Cricket Academy, aimed at children aged 8 to 17, planned for the October holidays. The AMRC reiterated its commitment to involving participants from diverse client communities in local sports and recreation activities.

School Backpack Give-Away

In collaboration with the Rotary Club of Mitcham the AMRC supported 100 children in receiving backpacks at the start of the new school year, thus relieving for many new arrivals the cost burden in accessing education.

Governance Training

The AMRC supported over sixty ethnic leaders with capacity building initiatives such as governance training, assistance in organising community events, support in applying for grants and assistance for them to engage in volunteering in order to further build skills and help their communities.

Building Capacity Through Advocacy

The Naracoorte Migrant Resource Centre (NMRC) supported Afghan women to enhance their leadership capabilities and to undertake advocacy activities within their local community. As part of this initiative, NMRC facilitated a session for these women to interact with the Minister of Primary Industries and Regional Development during the Country Cabinet's visit to the region. This initiative supported the empowerment of these women, leveraging their leadership roles and skills in furthering their involvement in advocacy work and fostering community development within Naracoorte.

SA Refugee Week

For over 20 years the AMRC has convened Refugee Week in South Australia, crafting a program of engaging activities in which small, and not so small, ethno-specific groups and other registered mainstream and community groups hold their own events. 2023's Refugee Week, with the theme Finding Freedom, set a record number of over 55 registered events hosted by over 100 stakeholders to showcase various multicultural events and activities. Although still termed Refugee Week, it has now become more of a month of activities, celebrating the positive contributions made by refugees. It is always a very public, pinnacle time emphasizing inclusivity and acknowledging the significant role refugees play in South Australia.

SA Refugee Week Launch

Over 60 government, community and other providers got together at the Adelaide Town Hall for the Launch of 2023 SA Refugee Week. The AMRC would like to thank The Right Honourable the Lord Mayor of Adelaide, Dr Jane Lomax-Smith AM, for hosting and launching the event with its inspiring speakers, including Elizabeth Ho OAM, Refugee Week Co-convener, refugee youth Ackim Mulumba and Fahima Āhmăđį sharing their stories, and Nava Ensemble with their multicultural performance. The celebration marked Refugee Week as one of South Australia's key annual activities to inform the public about refugees, and the AMRC is once again pleased to acknowledge the continuing assistance by the Department of Home Affairs and the support provided by the Government of South Australia.

World Refugee Day

World Refugee Day was marked at South Australia's Parliament House and supported by the Hon Zoe Bettison MP, Minister for Multicultural Affairs and Tourism, who hosted the event in partnership with the AMRC. Attended by many distinguished guests, it was a reminder of the level of official support for refugees in their quest to belong and thrive in South Australia. The Minister, in her speech, recognised the great diversity that refugees and migrants bring, and stressed the importance of raising awareness of the plight of refugees. She stated that, "we are all part of multicultural Australia." Hafeezullah and Martha, who came to Australia as refugees, shared their moving stories of achievement and also of giving back to the community and this was followed by an insightful reflection by Elizabeth Ho OAM. Overall it was an exciting program with empowering speeches, culminating in a multicultural performance from the Sounds of Hazara. The AMRC thanks everyone involved in putting on this event and especially the Minister and her team and all the participants who shared in making it such a very positive and inspiring evening.

Youth Poster Awards Exhibition

Over 200 students, young people, schools and families came along to the Festival Centre Children's Artspace for the launch of the 2023 Youth Poster Awards Exhibition. From a record number of 370 entries, the exhibition showcases 85 posters from primary, secondary and tertiary students. The posters spoke of peace, compassion, welcome, generosity and the importance of supporting refugees in building their new life in Australia. The ceremony had a very special Welcome to Country by Elaine Magias, and was launched by the Honourable Hieu Van Le AC, Chair of the Adelaide Festival Centre Trust, Chair of SAHMRI, former Governor of South Australia as well as former Chief Patron of the AMRC. Mr Douglas Gautier, CEO and Artistic Director of the Adelaide Festival Centre, welcomed everyone to the Children's Artspace, and spoke positively about the exhibition being a significant partnership between the AMRC and the Adelaide Festival Centre.

During the launch Miss Mathilda Todd, a year 9 student from Brighton Secondary School, and Miss Yen Banh, a year 8 student from St Mary's College, shared their experiences of being involved in the project. We would like to thank Mr Michael Brown MP, Member for Florey, representing the Minister for Tourism and Multicultural Affairs, Mr Ben Temperly, Deputy Chief Executive of the Department for Education, Ms Catherine Mwikya, representing the Deputy Leader of the Opposition in the Legislative Council, Shadow Minister for Multicultural South Australia and Shadow Minister for Tourism and Hospitality, and Ms Elizabeth Ho OAM, for their presence, support and their contributions. The exhibition was open from 23 June to 12 August 2023 at the Adelaide Festival Centre Children's Artspace, followed by a tour throughout metropolitan and regional South Australia.





Other Cultural Celebrations

Guy Sebastian's Message to Youth Forum

Adelaide's own Guy Sebastian sent an inspiring message of belonging and resilience to everyone at the AMRC Youth Forum for those of refugee and migrant background. Sharing his personal story and the challenges he faced over belonging, Sebastian delivered a resounding encouragement for those present. He stressed the significance of participation in such events which fostered a sense of community. Sebastian highlighted the importance of building communities with people we can trust and rely on and advocated sharing stories as a means of mutual support and guidance. His empowering words left a lasting impact, igniting hope and strength among those who have undergone challenging journeys.

Café Musica in the Fringe Festival

This event, an integral part of the Fringe Festival, featured vibrant multicultural performances that attracted over 160 attendees across three nights. It served as a platform for diverse groups to share their cultural heritage through music, dance, and artistic expression. Nowruz Festival

In collaboration with Afghan United Association and Middle Eastern Communities Council, celebrating Eid al-Fitr, this festival was launched by the Hon Zoe Bettison MP, Minister for Multicultural Affairs and Tourism. It embraced the richness of cultural diversity with engaging talks, folk music, traditional dance, poetry, and storytelling, thereby fostering a sense of unity and celebration amongst attendees.

Refugee Council of Australia (RCoA) Partnership

In 2023, the AMRC collaborated with the Refugee Council of Australia (RCoA) to spotlight fifty South Australians from refugee backgrounds. These individuals were featured in RCoA's national media campaign held during Refugee Week. The initiative included capturing both individual and group portraits by a skilled Afghan photographer, Muzafar Ali, an Hazara refugee and human rights activist. This partnership not only highlighted the diverse stories within AMRC's client communities but also contributed to a successful national showcasing during Refugee Week, emphasizing the resilience and contributions of refugees in Australia.

Northern Area MRC Citizen's Orchestra Workshop

In order to expand its activities across the arts, the AMRC hosted a workshop in collaboration with the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra which provided a unique opportunity for participants to immerse themselves in the world of orchestral music, thus fostering cultural appreciation and engagement.

Organizational Initiatives

The following are only a glimpse of the initiatives that collectively reflect the AMRC's multifaceted efforts to foster cultural diversity, community empowerment, and social cohesion across South Australia. Through our diverse programs and events, the AMRC continues to create inclusive spaces, celebrate diversity, and offer crucial support to individuals and communities navigating the various challenges in their path towards successful settlement.

Impact through collaborations and partnerships

The AMRC has both strengthened its existing partnerships and built new ones in order to increase opportunities and resources for our new and establishing communities. Throughout the year the AMRC has been working with over 350 stakeholders and partners to support successful settlement outcomes for new arrivals.

Mt Gambier Multicultural Community Centre

The completion of renovations to this centre reinforces the AMRC's dedication to providing a conducive space for community activities. This was also notably supported by the South Australian government.

Celebrating Community Champions

This event was a heartfelt acknowledgment of the invaluable contributions made by stakeholders and volunteers, recognizing their role in strengthening community bonds and connections.

Specialist Services -Access and Equity

The AMRC provides specialized support to individuals from culturally diverse backgrounds through a wide range of services. We offer personalized assistance, in-home care, group activities, and one-on-one case management. Our focus is on building capacity and increasing participation. In 2023, our team assisted people through the following programs.

Homecare Packages and the Community Home Support Program (CHSP) enables independent living for the elderly in their own homes through services such as:

- Domestic assistance
- Personal care
- Transport
- Social supports
- Meal preparation
- Plan coordination

People with Disabilities Program assists clients to achieve their goals and to access the necessary resources support through such schemes as the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS). Empowering People with Disabilities Program through the Information, Linkages and Capacity Building (ILC) Program provides:

- Individual tailored service
- Social, sports and recreational activities
- Skill-learning sessions
- Wellbeing and music therapy activities
- Community engagement activities
- Well-being support sessions for carers
- Information sessions and workshops
- Access and support to engage with needed services

Carers and Family Members Program supports those caring for individuals with disabilities and/or the elderly by assisting to build capacity and to navigate available resources. By offering tailored, integrated support, we both facilitate access to services and increase awareness and participation in the community.

Highlights

Zoo Excursions

In a joint effort under the AMRC's Empowering People with Disabilities Program, the Northern Area Multicultural Women's Network and the Afghan United Association of SA, supported by Rotary Club of Campbelltown's donation, three excursions to the Adelaide Zoo were undertaken during school holidays. Over 80 individuals, including parents, children, and people with disabilities, participated. These visits fostered social connections among families, parents, and children with disabilities whilst providing educational opportunities to learn about Australia's native animals.

Quarterly Senior Social Group Excursions

Every three months, our Senior Social Group Excursions, supported by our committed care workers, case managers, and registered nurses, successfully brought together over 50 older individuals for excursions to locations like Largs Bay and Victor Harbor. These outings served as vital social events, fostering connections and embracing moments of joy for our seniors, building connections with one another while supporting them to live independently, promoting reablement and wellbeing.

International Day of People with Disabilities Celebration/Year-end Fun Day

The celebration of the International Day of People with Disabilities was a resounding success with 130 individuals, including people with disabilities, their caregivers and family members coming together at the Playford Bowling Club to commemorate this special occasion. The growing number of attendees each year reflects an increasing awareness due to the positive impact and dedicated services of the AMRC and their partners, in this particular instance with the Rotary Club of Campbelltown who jointly mounted this collaborative event. Through such activities the AMRC is able to connect and support ethnic communities as well as provide information, access to, and collaborations with, services and partners. Above all it is able to promote the remarkable achievements and contributions of people with disabilities.

MRC Works – Training and Employment

The MRC Works team delivers essential support to individuals from migrant and refugee backgrounds, focusing on education, skills training, employment pathways, and English language development. As a Registered Training Organisation, our team are highly qualified trainers and assessors with extensive industry expertise and working with people from diverse backgrounds. We facilitate:

Employment Opportunities: Offering training, qualifications, and support to women and young people, enhancing their employability and facilitating career progression.

Preparation for Employment: Providing pre-vocational training, work placements, employment screening, industry expectations and volunteer opportunities to prepare individuals for the workforce.

Youth Career Development: Assisting young individuals in identifying and pursuing career pathways.

Community and Employment Engagement: Conducting expos, language programs, child-safe environment training and cultural competency sessions for various stakeholders, including employers and educational institutions, to foster better support and increase opportunities for individuals from diverse backgrounds.

Throughout 2023, our team successfully engaged in programs such as the Women's Employment into Action, volunteer training, cultural competence workshops and initiatives focused on employment and education. These efforts support the empowerment of individuals from migrant and refugee backgrounds, equipping them with the necessary skills and resources to thrive in their chosen career paths and within their new communities. 513 Individuals received cultural awareness training

Highlights

Women's Employment in Action (WEiA) Celebration

A WEiA celebration, coupled with a certificate presentation ceremony, highlighted the successful culmination of the WEiA training program. More than 110 women completed this program, acquiring language proficiency and skill qualifications crucial for their employment journey. These women have not only gained confidence but also expanded their skill sets and knowledge, empowering them to confidently enter the job market.

Cultural Awareness Trainings

Cultural awareness trainings were successfully conducted across various industries and sectors including at TAFE SA's Salisbury and Adelaide campuses, engaging over 130 staff, tutors, and lecturers. The sessions garnered overwhelmingly positive feedback, with many participants citing it as the most impactful cultural awareness training they've come across.

AMEP for Vulnerable Groups

In partnership with TAFE SA/AMEP we delivered classes for women and other vulnerable groups who were not able to access AMEP in other ways. Classes were run by AMEP teachers at AMRC facilities which also provided creche support for mothers with young children. This included classes in Adelaide, Salisbury and Naracoorte, with an additional night class opening in Naracoorte in Term 4 to address the need of workers to improve their skills. The Pilot Program is an innovative example of how local services come together to address a gap in services.

Community English Classes

Our community English conversation classes run by volunteers continued throughout the year in various AMRC outlets. This included English classes run for Ukranians in Adelaide, and diverse groups in Murray Bridge, Naracoorte, Bordertown and Mt Gambier. I had learnt real life experiences from the mentor who previously worked in the Health Care sector. I was thrilled when my interviewer commented that I had answered all my interview questions confidently and well. I had received my employment offer within 3 days from my interview and was offered a 40-hour part-time permanent contract. I owe this employment success to the AMRC!

Parents Next Program Consultation

Collaborating with the Settlement Council of Australia and the Department of Employment and Workplace Relations (DEWR), the AMRC conducted consultations for the design of the new Parents Next Program. Twenty-three women from diverse backgrounds shared their experiences as young parents navigating education and employment pathways, offering invaluable insights for program development.

Employment Pathways Workshops

A comprehensive series of over twenty Employment Pathways Workshops targeted at women and unemployed migrant/ refugee clients was conducted. These workshops witnessed remarkable attendance, engaging up to 379 participants eager to explore and navigate various avenues toward employment.

English for Work Program

The English for Work Program, a collaboration between AMRC and Community Corporate, focused on supporting job seekers who arrived on humanitarian visas. This three day program aimed to enhance participants' English-speaking confidence in workplace settings. It covered crucial topics including teamwork, goal setting, digital literacy, and interview tips, equipping individuals with essential skills for employment success.







Expos and Workshops

In 2023, the AMRC actively participated in numerous training and employment expos, broadening our outreach and impact. We showcased our stakeholders' stalls at significant events like the International Women's Day forum, Youth Forum, and AMRC Health and Wellbeing expos. Additionally, we presented at diverse expos such as the MBEN Conference, TAFE SA with over 150 attending students, and other events facilitated by the Local Jobs Plan. These engagements allowed us to not only disseminate information about our services but also facilitated direct connections between our clients and potential employers, fostering meaningful opportunities.

Volunteer Engagement and Training

Our volunteer program played a pivotal role in assisting new arrivals without prior Australian work experience. Through this initiative, individuals received support to understand workplace compliance, policies and requirements, and prepare for various clearances. This year, we provided training to 105 volunteers, resulting in 38 successful job outcomes and others progressing into further training and English language acquisition, supporting them to build their skills for future employment opportunities.

The class at TAFE is hard for me. It took a year to get used to the system. But coming to this class at the AMRC is one of the most valuable things I have done. I am speaking, reading and writing English. The teacher is very good.

The interactive session at the beginning was very well received, as was the exceptional knowledge of Simon and his ability to answer difficult questions concerning the governing of Myanmar. One of our lecturers said it was the best cultural awareness PD we have had to date! Another said she learnt a lot and it clarified some confusion she had about Myanmar. Thanks so much for adhering to the brief as it was very supportive for our lecturers.

Community Development and Engagement

Through Community Development and Engagement the AMRC offers comprehensive support to individuals and communities, focusing on identifying their aspirations, needs, and interests. We support communities to build self-agency by enhancing capacity, building resources, and cultivating skills in advocacy, governance, and leadership. Throughout 2023, our team actively facilitated a wide array of programs and activities, including the following.

Community Empowerment Initiatives: Strengthening community capacity through tailored programs.

Women's Empowerment Programs: Conducting educational workshops, expos, and forums like the International Women's Day event, Women's Employment into Action and Ethnic Women Leader's Forum to recognize and empower refugee and migrant women and to provide opportunities for them to recognise and build on their skills and connections.

Youth Engagement: Organizing forums, leadership programs, and activities such as the Youth Parliament Program and Multicultural Youth Link of South Australia (MYLSA) engagements.

Community Leadership Forums: Fostering connections between settlement, community, and industry through forums and activities like the Ethnic Leaders' Forums.

Inclusivity and Awareness: Celebrating diversity and promoting inclusivity with the mainstream through events like International Women's Day, Youth Forum, International Day of People with Disabilities.

Financial Education and Support: Providing workshops on financial management, education, and emergency relief.

Cultural Development: Nurturing arts, sports, and recreational activities within the community.

Infrastructure and Facilities: Supporting communities with accessing facilities and services such as crèche services.

These initiatives collectively contributed to the holistic development and empowerment of individuals and communities by addressing their diverse needs and aspirations.

Highlights

International Women's Day Forum 2023

The AMRC hosted over 250 women and men at our International Women's Day Forum held at the Adelaide Festival Centre on the 7th of March. The forum recognised the contributions of migrant and refugee women with stories, performances and inspirational speakers. It was an incredible honour to have the event launched by the Hon Chris Kourakis, Chief Justice of South Australia, who highlighted the importance of a gender equal future and of all of us having a role to play in supporting women's advancement. This year's event was also dedicated to recognising the contributions to multiculturalism of Ms Eugenia Tsoulis OAM, immediate past AMRC Chief Executive Officer. This was followed by inspirational stories from future refugee and migrant women leaders: Esther Nichun, Shaona Imaru, and Fahima Ahmadi.

The IWD consultation forum was then facilitated by the Commissioner for Children and Young People, Helen Connolly, giving women the opportunity to have a voice that can support policy and process change.

Ethnic Leaders' Forum

The Ethnic Leaders Forums served as a vital platform for connecting ethnic leaders with diverse groups, mainstream providers, and stakeholders. These sessions facilitated capacity building, information sharing, and employment opportunities while supporting governance and advocacy efforts. Throughout the year, we conducted six sessions that enabled meaningful discussions and initiatives by fostering diverse voices and ideas. The forums also encouraged community leaders to actively contribute feedback to the Multicultural Feedback Review, ensuring their perspectives shaped important decisions and initiatives.

Ethnic Women Leaders' Forum

In collaboration with the Council of Migrant and Refugee Women (CMRW), the Ethnic Women's Leader Forum attracted women leaders from the Afghan, Bhutanese, Liberian, Filipino, Cambodian, Armenian, Tanzanian, Ahwazi, Chinese, Ukrainian, Congolese, Vietnamese and Latin American communities.



Over sixty participants, representing various ethnicities, shared stories of triumphs, challenges, and accomplishments. The forum served as a platform where supportive service providers offered valuable resources and information. Additionally, the event provided an opportunity to commemorate White Ribbon Day, emphasizing empowerment in the journeys of women. The forum also provided opportunities for professional migrant and refugee women to connect with new arrival women, tapping into shared experiences and support.

Strengthening Stakeholder Connections through Connecting Settlement, Community and Industry (CSCI) Forums

The CSCI program provides a regular forum for local services, community and industry to progress linkages and engagement of diverse cultural groups. The forum's objectives are to:

- Further connections and collaboration of settlement and community services working with new and establishing communities
- Use member networks and advocacy channels to identify and progress the resolution of gaps, issues and challenges that may impede sustainable settlement and the integration of new migrants
- Support population growth and economic and civic development in local areas and regions
- Support and assist the organisation of forums, events and other activities that have a positive impact on harmony and social cohesion.

The AMRC held eight CSCI Forums during 2023 in Adelaide, Murray Bridge, Naracoorte, Bordertown, Mt Gambier and Whyalla. The young people from the panel sharing their stories were very moving and inspiring. Hearing the issues they faced in coming to Australia made me realise how much I take for granted.

A surprise was Adelaide celebrity Guy Sebastian who presented via video messaging to emphasise the importance of embracing uniqueness and building resilience to empower young attendees. The Community Panel also offered poignant insights into our communities' rich experiences. Engaging activities like Human Bingo, facilitated by the Commissioner, brought everyone together in an interactive and enjoyable way.

The event was a platform that echoed laughter, broke cultural barriers, and showcased the beauty of the multicultural community. The Youth Forum 2023 served as an inspirational space, embracing differences, celebrating unity, and empowering young individuals to embrace their uniqueness while building resilience for their future endeavours. The stories, talents, and insights have left an indelible mark, inspiring us all to work towards creating more opportunities for our younger generations to flourish.





Health and Wellbeing Expos

The Health and Wellbeing Expos in Adelaide and Salisbury included over 30 different stakeholders and drew in over 300 participants from diverse backgrounds including from Afghanistan, Sudan, Congo, Liberia, Myanmar, Bhutan, Syria, Venezuela, and more. The expos provided invaluable information on healthcare, NDIS services, the Australian education system and education courses, employment pathways, sports activities, and an array of other resources. Participants gained valuable information and made great connections with stakeholders opening further pathways in their settlement journey.

Kiribati Independence Day

Kiribati Independence Day was commemorated through a collaborative initiative involving the AMRC, the Kiribati Community, Teys Australia, and the Lions Club. The joint effort delivered celebratory community events in regional areas, signifying a significant milestone – not only Kiribati's independence but also a profound step forward in bringing together mainstream stakeholders and ethnic leaders. The collaboration aimed to foster inclusivity and unity within the community, showcasing the power of cooperation between diverse groups for a shared celebration.

A Joyful Life Book Launch

The "A Joyful Life" book launch was a joint effort between the AMRC, the University of South Australia, the African Communities Council of South Australia, Dr. Lillian Mwanri and Dymocks Books. Authored by Rosemary Kariuki, a recipient of the Medal of the Order of Australia and an esteemed local figure, the book offers a compelling memoir and inspiring narrative of Kariuki's life. It unveils an extraordinary journey, depicting personal triumph, resilience, and the profound impact of community support in achieving a joyful existence. This event was delivered during Refugee Week which showcases refugee stories and hopes to increase awareness around the contributions of refugees. Latin American Migrant and Refugee Support Group

Adelaide Multicultural Women Iftar Event

Adelaide multicultural women were supported in organizing an Iftar event during SA Refugee Week. Held at the Adelaide Community Centre, the event attracted over 60 participants. Assistance was provided in securing a cost-free venue thus supporting the group to facilitate safe, social, and culturally significant activities for many young women in the community.

Latin American Society of SA, Hispanic Women's Association and Latin American Migrant and Refugee Support Group of SA

In response to the recent humanitarian intake of individuals and families from Latin America, the AMRC has been engaging and working with these three Latin American associations. Collaborations provide greater support for new arrivals by facilitating a range of activities and events. Additionally, the AMRC is actively involved in building community capabilities by offering assistance with grant applications, donations, and other forms of support. These ethnic groups, operated by volunteers within the community, play a pivotal role in connecting both recent and established arrivals, ensuring a more comprehensive support network.

Regional Services and Highlights

Throughout 2023, our Regional Services Team continued to provide vital settlement support across Mount Gambier, Naracoorte, Bordertown, and the Murraylands. Highlights include services to new and establishing communities with:

- Individual and tailored client support and advocacy
- Youth services
- Financial education and support
- Assistance for domestic violence situations
- Education, skills training, and employment guidance
- Community-building initiatives like forums and workshops
- Housing, language, childcare, transportation, and disability support services

These efforts have supported individuals, families and communities, fostering resilience and success in their settlement journey by increasing local connections, growth and sustainability.

In 2023, our team achieved an array of significant milestones across the diverse regions we serve, showcasing our commitment to building capacity of those from refugee and migrant backgrounds to settle successfully and contribute to their new home. Some of these milestones follow.

Limestone Coast Area

We conducted four Ethnic Leaders' Forums, engaging small and establishing communities to update them on changes in federal government migration policies. Working closely with local property agencies, we facilitated housing support, ensuring clients were well-informed about the Australian property market regulations to meet their housing needs effectively.

Mount Gambier Migrant Resource Centre (MGMRC)

At MGMRC, our successful implementation of the Humanitarian Settlement Program meant extending a warm welcome to approximately 40 new arrivals, providing vital settlement services and housing provisions. Collaborating with local stakeholders, we organized community capacity building activities and hosted insightful CSCI forums that tackled the challenges around settlement, medical costs, housing and community sustainability and also discussed the Multicultural Framework Review. Additionally, we supported the Karenni Community of SA in hosting a fundraising event and partnered with the Australian Baroque Riding Academy for an Equine Therapy Farm Tour, offering spaces for those who have experienced trauma. Our commitment to well-being was evident through monthly 'Haven' sessions focused on empowering women as well as weekly activities catering to seniors and individuals with disabilities, thereby fostering social skills, confidence, and language proficiency.

Naracoorte Migrant Resource Centre (NMRC)

At NMRC we facilitated consultative forums addressing the needs of new Afghan arrivals and provided tailored English classes. Supporting the Limestone Coast Multicultural Network (LCMN) with governance and grant application training, we enhanced their capacity for effective operation. Our engagement extended to Connecting Settlement, Community, and Industry (CSCI) Forums which addressed crucial shortages in labour, housing, and childcare services. Cultural celebrations and events, such as those for Harmony Week, the Kiribati Independence Day Morning Tea and the Limestone Coast Multicultural Soccer Carnival, promoted inclusivity and unity among diverse communities. Additionally, through partnerships with Wellbeing SA and the University of South Australia, we raised health awareness and provided essential tax clinic sessions aimed at supporting new migrants.

Bordertown Migrant Resource Centre (BMRC)

Our initiatives at BMRC included hosting employment consultations and CSCI forums, supporting the Tatiara Islamic Society with facilities during Ramadan, and conducting regular English classes. Furthermore, we successfully delivered programs focusing on health, tax assistance, event management and sports, in order to enrich community engagement and to support their well-being.

Murraylands Migrant Resource Centre (MMRC)

At MMRC our engagement was extensive, encompassing Ethnic Leader and CSCI Forums, cultural events, educational programs, and referendum information sessions. Partnering with various organizations, including Unity College Student Support Project and Pacific Labour Mobility (PALM), we provided invaluable support to newly arrived migrants and refugee students and continued our collaboration to offer orientation and settlement services. Notable events like the Yuntu-Walun Multicultural Festival, Harmony Week Celebrations, and the All Cultures Fest were instrumental in fostering a sense of belonging and celebrating diversity.

Across all regions, our collaborative efforts extended beyond direct support, forming partnerships with local organizations, local government, employers, industry and educational institutions to strengthen community bonds and promote understanding. The AMRC hosted much appreciated workshops on financial literacy and driving initiatives and organized successful multicultural festivals and sporting events.

These activities show our commitment to building the capacity of individuals and communities from diverse backgrounds to engage with, and contribute effectively to, South Australia's society, culture, economy and environment.



Community-Driven Progress: Auspiced and Resident Partners

In 2023, the AMRC continued its robust collaboration with key partner organizations, emphasizing community ownership in service delivery and decision-making and building the capacity of local ethnic community led groups. This collaborative model, involving governments, NGOs, and local communities, underpins continuous improvement across programs and services. This approach also ensures holistic development and effective services, driven by shared responsibility and community involvement across diverse sectors. The key partners involved in this effort include:

African Communities Council of SA (ACCSA) and Middle Eastern Communities Council of SA (MECCSA)

ACCSA and MECCSA receive office space, training, meeting and administrative facilities from the AMRC to support their settlement and community development work with their client groups. The two councils represent over 45 African and Middle Eastern community groups. In 2023, through collaboration with ACCSA and MECCSA, we continued to actively contribute to various activities and forums bringing the various communities together. Some of the highlights were the Nowruz and sports and recreation activities delivered through MECCSA and the Unmasked African Festival and the African Cup of Nations events delivered by ACCSA, all of which brought the whole community together promoting social cohesion and harmony.

Multicultural Youth Link SA (MYLSA)

MYLSA is auspiced and supported by the AMRC. MYLSA represents a growing group of young people from refugee and migrant backgrounds who reinforce a support network through activities and forums with training in governance and representation, supporting new arrivals and other young people with similar experiences. It is a forum for experiential governance, assisting young people to become leaders of their communities. This year saw the election of a new committee trained to take part in the Youth Parliament and to present at public functions, at schools, and to other young people. One of the bigger highlights was the involvement and implementation of the Youth Forum Hopes and Dreams: Celebrating Youth Diversity. New and existing members shared their ideas about young people's sense of belonging and contributed to an innovative live drama project, as well as to program development and implementation which resulted in a hugely successful event.



Council of Migrant and Refugee Women of SA (CMRW)

The CMRW is governed by women of refugee and migrant backgrounds. It was established in February 2018 with a steadfast commitment to fostering the empowerment of those women and to build their participation in the economic, social, cultural, civil and political life of South Australia. It does so by working to overcome barriers to participation and by adopting an intersectional approach to gender equality. The primary objective is to unite the voices of our resilient communities with those who influence institutions and policy advocacy networks. Through this collaboration CMRW creates opportunities for migrant and refugee women to play a pivotal role in driving positive change within our community. This year the AMRC, in partnership with CMRW, organised two highly successful forums, the International Women's Day event celebrating women's success stories and the Ethnic Women Leader's Forum, bringing together leaders from various industries and promoting support and connections between new arrivals, refugee and migrant women.

Northern Multicultural Women's Network (NMWN)

NMWN provides volunteer support in the northern area through mentoring and linking women at risk with a view to sharing knowledge and skills with other women as well as supporting community participation. The network consists of sixty members aged 18-75 of diverse ethnicities. This year NMWN, in partnership with NAMRC, hosted a number of information sessions to raise awareness about personal safety, driving, women's rights and parenting. These activities are delivered by organising regular peer support groups and inviting guest speakers from a range of industries. NMWN also organised the wrapping of donated gifts to distribute to newly arrived families and continues to be dedicated to empowering women by enhancing social and leadership skills, offering training opportunities, and nurturing a thriving and supportive community.


Murraylands Multicultural Network (MMN)

In the past year, the AMRC continued its support for the Murraylands Multicultural Network (MMN), empowering them to serve as a voice for new arrivals in the Murraylands region. MMN's role encompassed supporting both communities and individuals whilst welcoming, and facilitating the integration and participation of, new arrivals into the local area. A highlight of this collaboration was the annual Murraylands Multicultural Yuntu-Walun Festival, attracting an impressive turnout of over 1,000 participants, predominantly local residents from Murray Bridge. Through such activities the AMRC and MMN are able to actively engage the local community and to promote cultural diversity and the value of multiculturalism within the Murraylands.

Limestone Coast Multicultural Network (LCMN)

In 2023 Naracoorte MRC (NMRC) continued to work closely with the LCMN in hosting a series of information sessions about visa requirements, housing, the settlement experience and other matters. NMRC also supported the network with governance training and in building capacity and continue to engage and support local events representing the diverse communities in the Limestone Coast and in promoting diversity in the region.





Research and Advocacy

AMRC's Drive to Improve Refugee and Migrant Settlement Experiences

The AMRC is deeply committed to increase awareness of refugee and migrant settlement challenges through its partnerships and research collaborations. This effort sheds light on the intricacies of settlement experiences and the various issues affecting refugee and migrant groups. These collaborations enable the AMRC to actively work towards implementing approaches that can significantly improve the experiences and contributions of these communities. By advocating for best practices and innovation, the AMRC strives to improve the overall settlement journey and to support the positive impact that refugee and migrant groups make within their new communities. The following is a listing of the AMRC's 2023 research partnerships and initiatives.





Research Partnerships

University of South Australia, Rebuilding Life after Migration: Settlement Experiences of Refugee and Migrant Youth.

The research on Rebuilding Life after Migration is in its final stage. This is a groundbreaking study across Australia, Canada, and the USA, exploring how various factors impact the settlement experiences of young migrants and refugees aged 15-24. With 1200 surveys and 54 focus groups, this comprehensive research aims to enhance understanding of mental health's role in successful settlement. The findings will guide improvements in wellbeing and settlement practices. The final report, based on international expertise and industry collaboration, will advocate evidence-based actions for better outcomes.

University of Adelaide, Empowering People with Disabilities Evaluation Report

This report offers an evaluation of the first two years of the Empowering People with Disabilities (EPD) project funded by the Department of Social Services (DSS) through its Individual Capacity Building Program (ICB) grant. The ICB program seeks to provide systemic, national access to peer support, mentoring and opportunities to build skills for people with a disability, their families and carers (DSS 2020). This report provides insights, evaluation and recommendations for successful implementation and improvement to be shared in the public sphere beyond 2023.

University of South Australia, Migrant Business Resilience in Regional South Australia

The AMRC, supported UniSA Business, is conducting a study on migrant entrepreneurship in regional South Australia. Aimed at understanding the challenges faced by migrant-run businesses, this project seeks solutions through firsthand insights. Migrant business owners are invited to participate in interviews, contributing to the development of tailored policies and support mechanisms. The study aims to identify challenges, explore coping strategies, and design support systems identifying business owners' needs for capacity building and upskilling for their businesses.

University of South Australia, Understanding Cultural Diversity in South Australia with Census 2021 Data

This report analysed the cultural diversity in South Australia and also specific regional areas such as Murray Bridge, Naracoorte, Bordertown, Mt Gambier and Whyalla. It aimed to support local diversity to inform tailored supports and services.

University of South Australia/Australian Housing and Urban Research Institute (AHURI), Housing temporary migrants: investigating challenges and policy opportunities

The AMRC also supported this research with University of South Australia and Australian Housing and Urban Research Institute (AHURI). An investigative panel will establish the housing circumstances and experiences of temporary visa holders (TVHs) in Australia and provide critical evidence of challenges and opportunities in the development of housing policy and service provision. The panel's findings will form a set of policy and practice recommendations to improve housing outcomes for TVHs.

Wallis Social Research, Evaluation of the National Careers Institute (NCI)

The AMRC provided feedback to the Department of Employment and Workplace Relations through Wallis Social Research who are undertaking an independent evaluation of the National Careers Institute to determine its effectiveness in the provision of careers information in Australia.

The AMRC also supported research around people from diverse backgrounds involved in farm work in regional areas as part of a project hoping to co-design resources for communities to improve wellbeing among rural communities, farmers, and farm workers. Also supported was research through Flinders University and the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT) which is looking at reintegration pathways for Pacific Labour Scheme (PLS) workers. It covers mental health, financial goals, financial stress or security, future self-employment, skills transfer and other factors.



Presentations

In 2023 the AMRC's active engagement as guest speakers facilitated the sharing of best practices and firsthand experiences in working with diverse communities. These presentations spanned across schools, communities, service providers, and various industry stakeholders.
